In the following sections, I show you a bit how to use  $\LaTeX$  to write text and format it. If you need more information on  $\LaTeX$ , just look for an introduction online.

# Chapter 3

## How to Write Text With L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X

### 3.1 Formatting Basics

You can write text in **bold** and *italics* and in `typewriter`. To make a new paragraph just leave an empty line in between the text.

You can make your text `large`, `larger`, `very large`, `huge`, and `huger`. But also `small`, `footnotesize`, `scriptsize`, and `tiny`.

With a "%", you can write a comment in your tex-file. Everything after it will not be considered to be a part of your thesis when compiling the tex-file. By writing `\footnotes{I am a footnote.}`<sup>1</sup> you make a footnote in L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X.

When you put text in between `\begin{center}` and `\end{center}` the text is centered.

#### 3.1.1 Quotation

When you have a long quotation, you should put it in between `\begin{quotation}` and `\end{quotation}`. The text will be formatted perfectly.

#### 3.1.2 Lists

- To make a list of bullet points put your points with `\item` in between `\begin{itemize}` and `\end{itemize}`.

- The result is a numbered list.

1. To make a numbered list put your stuff with `\item` in between `\begin{enumerate}` and `\end{enumerate}`.

2. It will look like this list.

a) To make a list with letters put your stuff with `\item` in between `\begin{enumerate}[a]` and `\end{enumerate}`.

b) The list will look good.

### 3.1.3 Mathematics

$\LaTeX$  is great at typesetting mathematics. To write a mathematical formula in a line just surround it with dollar signs ( $\$$ ). For example, if you write `\$e = mc^2\$` you will get:  $e = mc^2$ . To set formulas in a separate line surround it with `\$\$` and `\$\$`:

$$\binom{n}{k} = \frac{n!}{k!(n-k)!}$$

or with `\[` and `\]`:

$$\text{var}(\bar{x}) = \frac{\sigma^2}{n}$$

To number equations is also possible:

$$a + (-a) = 0 \tag{3.1}$$

To spread an equation over multiple lines is easy:

$$A = \frac{\pi r^2}{2} \tag{3.2}$$

$$= \frac{1}{2}\pi r^2 \tag{3.3}$$

## 3.2 How to Include Figures

Use the following template to include your image:

```

\begin{figure} [htb]
\centering
\includegraphics[width=0.3\textwidth]{filename}
\caption{Caption Goes Here}\label{fig:labelname}
\end{figure}

```

- Replace `filename` with the name of your image file (including the file extension).
- Replace `Caption goes here` with a brief description of the figure.
- Replace `labelname` with a unique label that you can use to reference the figure in your text.
- You can also add notes to the figure by using the `note` command.
- Use the `width` options to adjust the size of your image.
- Use the `[htb]` placement option to suggest where you would like the figure to be placed (e.g., here, top, bottom). However, keep in mind that LaTeX may place the figure elsewhere to improve page layout.
- Label your figures with unique and descriptive names to make them easy to reference in your text.
- Save your image file in the folder where the tex-file is.

I use, for example this:

```

\begin{figure}
\centering
\includegraphics[width=0.3\textwidth]{hslogo}
\caption{The Logo of the HS Fresenius}\label{fig:hslogo}
\note{Note: Here you can add some notes to the figure if necessary.}
\end{figure}

```

Please notice that `hslogo` refers to the file `hs-logo-cyan` that is saved in the same directory as this tex-file. The `\label{fig:hslogo}` allows you to cite the figure like this: In Figure 3.1 you see a figure with the logo of the HS Fresenius.

You may be wondering why your figure doesn't always appear exactly where you want it to in your document. This is because  $\LaTeX$  places it in a floating environment, which means it tries to find the best possible location for the figure based on various factors like page layout, text flow, and other content.

While it can be tempting to try and force the figure to appear in a particular location in your text, it's generally best to leave it to  $\LaTeX$  to decide. This is because manually adjusting the placement of figures can often lead to poor document layout and formatting issues. Instead, focus on providing clear and descriptive captions for your figures, and use appropriate placement options (like the `[htb]` option) to suggest where you would like the figure to appear.

### 3.3 How to Make Tables

## 3.4 References

$\LaTeX$  makes it easy to refer to sections, tables, figures, and pages within your document. Simply set a label with the `\label{key}` command and refer to it later using `\ref{key}`.

For example, in this document, we labeled the chapter titled "Introduction" with `\label{sec:intro}`. Now we can refer to it in various ways throughout the document. This is particularly useful when working with longer documents or when referencing specific sections or elements within a document. Just remember to make your labels descriptive and easy to remember. Here are some examples:

- `\ref{sec:intro}` will become 1
- `\autoref{sec:intro}` will become chapter 1
- `\pageref{sec:intro}` will become 6
- `\autopageref{sec:intro}` will become page 6

I can do the same with tables and figures.

- `\ref{tab:example}` will become 3.1
- `\autoref{tab:example}` will become Table 3.1
- `\pageref{tab:example}` will become 12
- `\autopageref{tab:example}` will become page 12

You can also refer to equations. For example with `\autoref{eq:greatmath}` you can refer to Equation 3.1. But only because you set the label within the equation:

```
\begin{equation}\label{eq:greatmath}
a + (-a) = 0
\end{equation}
```

## 3.5 Citations

Please follow the Handbook of Academic Writing by Hildebrandt and Nelke (2019) when it comes to citing work. Moreover, discuss with your supervisor which reference style you should use. It is incredibly easy to change the citation style in L<sup>A</sup>T<sub>E</sub>X. You just need to change this line of the template:

```
\bibliographystyle{apacite}
```

If your supervisor wants you to use another style just look out for the style that can be used instead. For example,

```
\bibliographystyle{aer}
```

would give you the citation style the *American Economic Review* is using. See more examples here:

### 3.5.1 Reference Manager

I highly recommend using a reference manager such as JabRef, see: [www.jabref.org](http://www.jabref.org). The program is free and works across all your devices and with all operating systems. In particular, it can handle BibTeX files well. What is a BibTeX file you may ask yourself. Well, you may have seen that this template comes with a file named `lit.bib`. In this file you should save all the bibliographical stuff that you want to cite. JabRef can help you here. Just install JabRef and open the `lit.bib` file of this template and you will see what I mean.

### 3.5.2 APA

If your supervisor says, for example, "use APA". Ask him: "Which version of APA?". The predefined bibliography style that is used in this template is `apacite` which uses the 6th edition of APA.<sup>2</sup>

### 3.5.3 Author (Year) And (Author, Year)

You can cite work with `\citet{}` and `\citep{}` as shown below. Of course, you need to refer to the so-called *bibtex-key*. That is a key that allows you to refer to a piece of literature that you put into your bibtex-file.

The corresponding bibtex file should contain the following:
